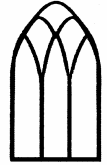

Our Prayer for Holy Week

This week we travel with Jesus on the difficult journey to the cross. With a love stronger than death Jesus journeys to a cross to make God's ways known. Oh, he had his moments of struggle. Even Jesus had a hard time accepting the will of God, his father. But ultimately he said these words, "Into your hands I commend my spirit." Habitat for Humanity

House Update



Thanks to all the dedicated volunteers (regular Tuesday and Thursday workers and the Saturday crew of FHPC and other church members, students and friends), work is progressing on the FHPC sponsored Habitat house for the Kerswell family. In February eleven teachers from the elementary school the Kerswell children attend worked all Saturday morning painting doors and interior trim. Pickens County Habitat for Humanity will host groups of college students as part of Collegiate Challenge 2010 during the month of March and we hope to have some of those students work on the house. The next items to be completed are: electrical work, installation of baseboard moldings, the front and back porch and installation of vinyl flooring and carpet.

Report on the 31st medical mission trip taken by Fort Hill Medical Mission:

Terrier Rouge, Haiti, January 24 to February 8, 2010

Fort Hill Medical Mission had traveled to Terrier Rouge in April 2009 and so we had familiarity with the region and the needs of the people there. But that was before the terrible earthquake which struck Port au Prince and points south on January 12. Terrier Rouge is in northern Haiti and we soon learned that even though the tremors were felt up there, the damage to property was negligible. However, tremendous damage was done to the emotions of all the Haitian people.

We were encouraged to go on as planned, the feeling being that any good thing which could be offered the people should be offered. And so there was a departure by Leslie Hicklin, Laura Lefevre, Vernie Roberts, Harold Cheatham, John and Cathy Spragins, Susan and me for Atlanta on January 23 with plans to spend the night near the airport so we could depart real early the morning of January 24 and be in Haiti by late afternoon. You may have heard about our delay in Fort Lauderdale because of mechanical problems with the aircraft which was to fly us on to Cap Haitien. We were disappointed but adhered to the rule that it is better to know of such problems while still on the ground. We were finally able to fly to Haiti the morning of January 26, and when we arrived at the Cap Haitien airport we were informed that surgical patients were waiting for us. This became the first trip where we arrived into the country, were transported to our working location, set up the operating room, and did surgery - all in the same day. It was a tribute to our team, and I am very proud of them - not just for that day but for all the days we were there. Susan and I were wonderfully supported by hard workers who sincerely cared for the people.

Over the two weeks we worked in the clinic and the operating room at Terrier Rouge as well as out in the villages where we evaluated all kinds of eye problems, searching for those we could help surgically. Spending time in the villages increases our awareness of the people's situations even though it removes some of the time we have to do the surgery. It becomes a balancing act. We worked with two charities which are doing remarkable things to help the people of that region - Bethlehem Ministry, based in Athens, Georgia, and Esperance et Vie (Hope and Life), the NGO in Haiti supported by Bethlehem Ministry. Space here does not allow for a detailed accounting of all the good that is being done, and any team member would be happy to talk with you about those people who carry the torch day after day.

Life changed for the Haitians after the earthquake - north, east, south, and west. Many family members living in the Port au Prince area were injured or killed and refugees left the capital to come north where they could be taken in by family and friends. Households expanded to accommodate these people, coming just with the clothes on their backs. You can imagine how difficult it would be for a poor family to take in 8 or 10 refugees, but that is just what is happening, repeated thousands of times. Young people are taking in the orphans of dead siblings. Permanent re-arrangements have suddenly become necessary. Life was already hard with survival being day to day. The stress has increased tremendously, and our hearts feel the heaviness. We came home with emotions burdened by the plight of the people there. The usual poverty, the difficulties, the frustrations, the grief - are now worse than ever and we could almost sense it steadily increasing before our eyes.

Personally, I have had a hard time adjusting to life back home after this trip. Susan and I have seen a lot over the past 11 years but this recent time in Haiti may have affected us and caused our hearts to hurt the most. At the same time, we know God is there in their midst. They truly depend on Him and walk with Him strongly. They teach us about faith!!

Please - don't forget Haiti. The people there need us to stand with them for the long haul. The news about Haiti will decrease but the suffering won't.

FHPC Efforts for Haiti

This column discusses relief efforts by the two organization, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and Water Missions International, for which special offerings were received during January. Additional efforts to help Haiti will be discussed in a later issue of The Window.

PDA has been making a major effort to help Haiti, using contributions designated for Haiti plus money from the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. As of mid February they had sent over \$500,000 to Haiti, with more to come - including \$7,564 donated by FHPC members. PDA is working with partners such as Action by Churches Together (ACT) and Church World Service. Efforts include: Food, water and 35,000 hygiene kits and baby kits; temporary shelters for people left homeless; supplies and infrastructure support for Hôpital Sainte Croix (Holy Cross Hospital) - a Presbyterian-supported hospital; plus initial assessments and ground work for psycho-social recovery (PDA is seeking trauma counselors fluent in French or Creole).

Water Missions International, based in Charleston, and recipient of \$2,255 in FHPC offerings, launched an all out effort. In 31 days WMI assembled and shipped more than 100 water treatment systems, including about 60 Living Water Treatment Systems and 40 Erosion Chlorinators, capable of providing half a million gallons of safe drinking water per day - enough for 300,000 to 500,000 peoples. They raised and spent over \$1,500,000 in addition to numerous hours of assembly - assembling one Living Water Treatment System requires 40 hours, virtually all by volunteers. A recent email from Molly Greene, cofounder of WMI, stated: "We will be responding for an extended period of time and I am sure we will be wearing our 'faithful volunteers' out before too long." We hope to recruit volunteers to go to Charleston and help local WMI volunteers as they assist Haiti and other areas around the world, possibly coordinating with WMI's Walk for Water on March 20, <http://www.watermissions.org/walk>.
